

## Youth Services

## **Every Child Ready to Read at Putnam County Public Library**



These five practices will get your child on the way to reading success!

1. READ - Reading aloud is the single most important activity for your child's reading success. Remember to keep the interaction around the book a positive one. When children have positive experiences around books and reading, they are more likely to stick with learning to read, even if it is difficult.

2. TALK - Giving your child many opportunities to talk helps them build a large vocabulary and increases their ability to describe events and tell stories. Talk to your child when you are playing or running errands.

3. WRITE - Children learn about letters, words, and stories when given the chance to try writing on their own. Writing goes through stages of light markings to letter like forms to drawing letters to forming them. When children scribble and then say what it means, they are understanding that what they have written or drawn means something.

4. SING - Singing (and rhyming) slows language down and allows children to hear and play with smaller sounds in words. This helps children later sound out words. Some songs even have words that we would not hear in normal conversation with young children, so they are also building vocabulary!

5. PLAY - Children learn by doing. Play is a powerful way for children to connect what they know to the world, and it helps them think symbolically. One item represents another - a block might represent a telephone. This kind of symbolic thinking is the same kind of thinking that is used for reading. Pictures and letters represent real things.

Early Literacy is everything a child knows about reading and writing before they can actually read and write. Children begin to develop literacy at birth. Chewing on a book, playing with shape sorters, reading a book over and over, scribbling, playing dress-up, and singing silly songs are all part of early literacy.

Librarians at Putnam County Public Library are trained in the national early literacy initiative, "Every Child Ready to Read @ Your Library," which teaches parents, caregivers, and early childhood educators about these five critical practices that boost literacy skills, as well as recent brain research and techniques for reading and selecting books for children.

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# Local History

## Using FamilySearch for Genealogy Research




The Big Rock Candy Mountain of Genealogy

The largest repository of local history and genealogy records is housed in vaults built in a granite mountain located near Salt Lake City, Utah. It was built in 1965 to preserve the records that have been collected through agreements with archives, libraries, and churches from more than 100 countries. The collection is comprised of 3.5 billion images on microfilm, microfiche, and digital media. Its formal name is the Granite Mountain Records Vault, but I like to call it the Big Rock Candy Mountain of Genealogy.

#### THE MICROFILM LENDING LIBRARY

The vaults in Utah are not open to the public. However, FamilySearch developed a lending system that some genealogists used to borrow microfilm from the facility. Unfortunately, most of the borrowing libraries in Indiana were several miles away and since they were staffed by volunteers, the visiting hours were limited. Listening to the needs of our patrons, the Putnam County Public Library partnered with FamilySearch and became an affiliate library in December of 2014.



Local patrons have ordered microfilm from as far as Germany and Japan for a nominal fee. We replaced our broken microfilm reader with a modern one that allows patrons to edit and save digital images. The Affiliate Program costs the taxpayers nothing. The cost of borrowing the films was nominal and charged to the patron, not the library. We have, as a permanent collection, many microfilms such as the original birth and death records of Putnam County, so our patrons can see images that are no longer accessible to the public.



#### The Digital Age

Microfilm has a long shelf life as far as preservation is concerned, but FamilySearch has been digitizing the collection. They announced that the microfilm lending service would close in September 2017. The rising costs and the fact that their digitization was progressing so quickly (1000 films per day) were determining factors for the closing. Genealogists scrambled to order film before the deadline. Even though the projected completion date for the digitization of all 3.5 billion images is 2020, researchers were anxious. What would they do in the meantime if they wanted records? Many people cannot afford or have the time to travel to other counties, other states, even other countries where their ancestors lived to search for records.

#### Affiliate Library's New Role -We Have Special Powers!

FamilySearch rose to the occasion and decided to give the public libraries in their Affiliate program internet access to a special portal previously reserved in their Family History Centers. Again, this access cost the taxpayers nothing. We now have "Special Powers."

Many FamilySearch records are already accessible from home, but many of them are not due to the legal agreements set up when the records were filmed. For example, you can find most marriage records from across the country. They are photographs of the actual books housed in courthouses and archives. However, deed books are typically not accessible from home. You will see the collection marked with a little key, indicating they are locked. Since we are an affiliate, these images are unlocked when you come to the library. You can access them from our terminals, or via Wi-Fi, on your laptop, tablet or smart phone. You can print the documents from our computers or save them and print them at home from yours.

#### Armchair Research

If you have been attending our Time Travelin' Genealogy Guild meetings, you already know about this new program. Some of you have been slipping into the library more often to gain access to this portal. Some of you have broken through brick walls because of our newly acquired "Special Powers." I have found it to be a fantastic tool and use it regularly for myself as well as my patrons. You can dig deeper into records from a comfortable seat without climbing ladders and lifting heavy books. And you don't have to leave at 4:00pm when government offices close.
