From the Director

It's been said that we're currently experiencing a television renaissance. Drama, comedy, sci-fi, horror, and reality shows (now called "series") are surpassing feature-length films as the visual entertainment of choice for a large part of the population. The widespread adoption of streaming platforms like Netflix and Hulu seems to have a reorienting effect on our viewing habits, as binge-watching (or marathoning) has quickly become the default mode of consumption. There's a strange sort of virtue in this popular ritual involving prolonged storytelling, focus, and commitment which, in a strange way, is not totally unlike reading a novel. Some of these companies have also gotten into the production game, which means there's even more (and arguably better) content out there to dig into. From classics like *The Wire* and *Sex and the City* to today's *Game of Thrones, The Handmaid's Tale*, and *House of Cards*, the list of exciting series goes on and on. With so much to choose from, it's hard to know where to begin.

That's where we come in. The library has an enormous collection of television shows on DVD to choose from. If you're into *Inspector Lewis*, try the Lynley mysteries or (if you're brave enough) take a step into the dark and try *Luther* or *Ripper Street*. If *Breaking Bad* is your thing, then you're probably ready for *Better Call Saul*. Fans of *Weeds* should try *Orange is the New Black*. If you love *Game of Thrones*, well sorry, there's nothing quite like *Game of Thrones*! A rare and personal recommendation: the British series of Sherlock Holmes episodes produced between 1984 and 1994 by Granada Television. Jeremy Brett stars as Holmes, and there's never been anyone so perfectly suited, so obsessively engrossed in the role as he was (he apparently suffered two heart attacks on the set as a result of his intensity). Basil Rathbone is the classic favorite, and Benedict Cumberbatch currently plays a mean Holmes in Sherlock. But Jeremy Brett was like no other Holmes, big screen or small.

And what better time than the holidays to revel in this television rebirth? What could be better than the warmth of the TV screen on a cold December evening? Try something new this holiday season and enjoy the "platinum age of television" while it lasts!

Another year has flown by, and we have lots of news to share with you.







Cozy Up to Winter Read-Alouds Perfect for the Whole Family



As the weather turns colder, consider reading aloud a winter themed chapter book that will make you want to snuggle up with a mug of hot cocoa and lots of marshmallows. Perfect for car rides over the holidays or winter blizzards rage outside. Most of these are are great for independent reads for kids ages 8 and up, but younger kids will appreciate listening to them. Children's listening comprehension is higher than reading comprehension, so don't be afraid to give some of these a try.

Neil Gaiman's Odd and the Frost Giants is inspired by Norse Mythology. An unlucky twelve-year-old Norwegian boy named Odd leads the Norse gods Loki, Thor, and Odin in an attempt to outwit evil Frost Giants who have taken over Asgard. This is a great choice for fans of Percy Jackson.

Breadcrumbs by Anne Ursu is inspired by Hans Christian Andersson's The Snow Queen, and is perfect for kids who love fairytales. Hazel and Jack are best friends until an accident with a magical mirror and a run-in with a villainous queen find Hazel on her own, entering an enchanted wood in the hopes of saving Jack's life. Breadcrumbs is also available on as an ebook or online audiobook through Over-Drive!

Chris Kurtz's The Adventures of a South Pole Pig is just a delight. Flora the pig ditches the sedentary life on the farm for an adventure in Antarctica, where she escapes the knife and lives her dream of pulling a sled with a team of dogs

This Newbery Honor book from 1983 is still as funny today as it was then. Mr. Popper's Penguins by Richard Atwater tells the story of Mr. Popper and his family who unexpectedly adopt a penguin that changes the life and fortunes of Mr. Popper. Also available on audio.

The Lion, The Witch, and the Wardrobe by C.S. Lewis is perfect to read aloud this time of year. If you're not familiar with the story: Four English schoolchildren find their way through the back of a wardrobe into the magic land of Narnia and assist Aslan, the golden lion, to triumph over the White Witch, who has cursed the land with eternal winter. We have this classic in all the formats you could want: print, audio, ebook and audio, video, and even a picture book version!



Local History

Remembering IBM



Historically Putnam County businesses have had a significant impact on who we are as a community. IBM had a particularly significant impact. IBM was officially dedicated on October 30, 1954. It was an important part of the county for more than thirty years before it closed its doors in 1987. The Local History Department offers a wonderful glimpse into its history with our IBM photograph collection.



Our hundreds of photographs in the collection do an impressive job of depicting the IBM community and

its culture. Of course images of the building and their workers are included but more importantly, so too are photographs of the workers with their families and friends engaging in many sorts of activities promoted by the company. They range from Halloween parties, Christmas parties, and Easter egg hunts, to picnics and club events. The company did a fine job of recording details of the photographs, such as the event, year, and who was depicted in the photograph. Unfortunately most of the photographs remain unidentified.

Those who remember the IBM years may find themselves feeling nostalgic when viewing the photographs, but they are also sure to find them informative, portraying life among a large company from the 1950s to the mid-1980s. I invite members of the community to visit the Local History Department and spend a little time exploring this collection.
